QCE and ATAR - A Quick guide for students and families

What is the QCE?

The Queensland Certificate of Education (QCE) is Queensland's senior school qualification, awarded to students who meet specific requirements by the end of Year 12.

To be eligible for a QCE, students must:

- Complete 20 credits from General, Applied, VET or other recognised studies
- Achieve a set standard (e.g. C grade or higher in General subjects)
- Meet literacy and numeracy requirements

The QCE shows that a student has achieved a significant amount of learning at a set standard and is ready for further education, training or work.

What is the ATAR?

The Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR) is a rank (not a score) from 0.00 to 99.95 that indicates a student's position relative to other students in their age group. It is used for university admission across Australia.

How is the ATAR calculated?

- Calculated by the Queensland Tertiary Admissions Centre (QTAC)
- Based on a student's best 5 General subject results, or
- 4 General subjects + 1 Applied subject or VET qualification
- Includes scaling to adjust for subject difficulty

Note: The ATAR is only needed for university entrance. Students not planning to go to university may not need an ATAR.

Pathway essentials

The following may be useful reference to help decipher the world of acronyms education speaks in within the Senior Phase of Learning:

Acronym (Term)	Definition
QCE	The Queensland Certificate of Education is Queensland's senior secondary schooling qualification. It is internationally recognised and allows students to choose from a wide range of learning options to suit their interests and career goals. To receive certification, students must achieve the set amount of learning, at the set standard, in a set pattern, while meeting literacy and numeracy requirements.
QCIA	The Queensland Certificate of Individual Achievement recognises and reports the achievements of students whose learning is part of an individual learning program. It provides students with a summary of their skills and knowledge to present to employers and training providers.
ATAR	The Australian Tertiary Admission Rank is a rank used for tertiary application. It indicates a student's position overall, relative to other students. The Queensland Tertiary Admissions Centre calculates and issues ATARs: calculated from the highest results in 5 General subjects, or the highest results in 4 General subjects + 1 Applied subject or completed VET qualification III level or above. ATARs are expressed as a number from 99.95 down to 0.00 in steps of 0.05. The highest ATAR is 99.95, then 99.90, then 99.85, and so on, down to 0.00 (ATARs below 30 are reported as '30.00 or less').
VET	Vocational Education and Training is learning that directly relates to getting a job. It can be accessed at every stage of our work life, whether you're a student, a job seeker or already employed.
SAT	School-based apprenticeships and traineeships provide an opportunity for students in Years 10, 11 and 12 to undertake employment-based training while continuing full-time enrolment at school.
QTAC	The Queensland Tertiary Admissions Centre processes applications for most undergraduate & selected postgraduate programs offered by Queensland universities.
Tertiary qualification	In Australia, a tertiary qualification refers to any form of post-secondary education or training typically earned after secondary school. It is offered by universities, vocational education and training institutions, and other accredited providers.
General subject	General subjects are suited to students who are interested in pathways beyond senior secondary schooling that lead to tertiary study and pathways for vocational education and training and work. Results in General subjects contribute to the award of a QCE and may contribute to an ATAR.
Applied subject	Applied subjects are suited to students who are primarily interested in pathways beyond senior secondary schooling that lead to vocational education and training or work. Results in Applied subjects contribute to the award of a QCE and up to one Applied subject result may contribute to an ATAR.
Prerequisite	Some tertiary courses have prerequisite requirements. That means you must meet the requirements to gain entry to these courses.
Assumed knowledge	Some tertiary courses assume you will have certain knowledge or skills, rather than outlining prerequisite requirements.
